

Safari RSS is Apple's Web Browser and NewsFeed Reader Software

You can use it browse the internet in various ways, such as:

- Visit Web Sites
- Shop on-line
- Download software or media
- View News Feeds
- Do searches for almost any type of Information
- Find and download Images
- Blogging, etc

Safari is an incredibly fast Web Browser

At the top of the Window is the Location Bar

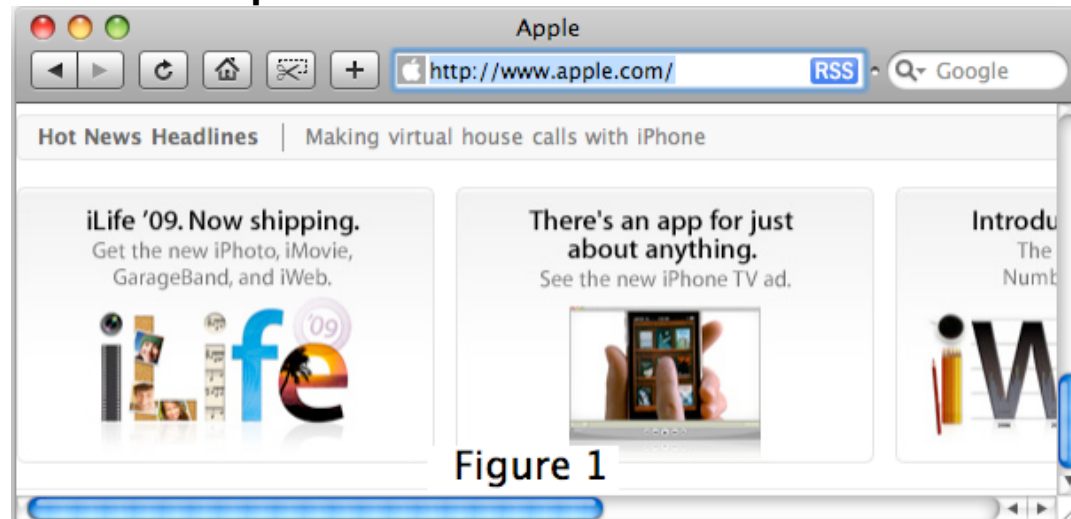
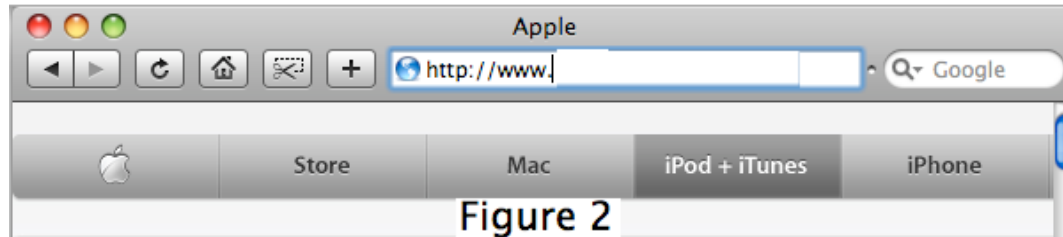


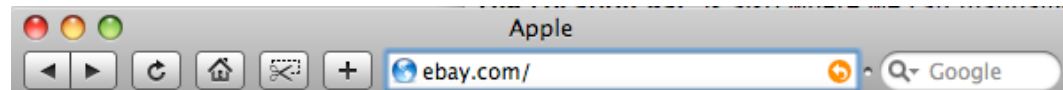

The Location Bar shows the address of the Web Page that we are currently displaying (Figure. 1). The **Title of the Web Page** is the text above the **Location Bar**. In the example above the page title is “**Apple**” (Figure 1).

The Location Bar is also where we can manually type in an address that we are going to visit (Figure 2). If you want to email a link to the page that you are viewing, you can select all of the text in the Address Bar, copy it, then paste the address into an email or other document.



It is not necessary to always type in the text :http://www. For example, if you simply type in ebay.com (Figure 3).



Press the Return Key – Safari will enter the required information for you. Then,



Safari Downloads the page that you requested (Figure 4).

Close Window, Minimize Window and Maximize Buttons

The Close Window, Minimize Window and Maximize Buttons are located at the top left corner of the window.

- The Red Button closes the window, but does not “Quit” the Safari Application.
- The Yellow Button minimizes the window down into the Dock. When you want to bring the page back up onto the screen, just click on its icon in the dock.
- The Green Button Maximizes the window to fit the available screen space.

Back and Forward Arrows

Previous and Next Page Buttons

The Previous and Next Page buttons are the arrows that are located on the top left corner just below the Red Yellow and Green Buttons. These arrows allow you to navigate back and forth between pages that you have already visited in the current session (Figure 6).

Reload Current Page Button

The curving arrow button, to the right of the of forward and back arrows is the reload current page. This button forces Safari to re-download the page that you are currently on (Figure 6). You can also use this button to stop a page that is currently downloading.

The Home Page Button

If you click on the **Home Button** in the Toolbar Safari will display the page that you have selected as your “**Home Page**” (Figure 6).

Google Search Bar

At the top right side of the Toolbar is a “Google Search” Bar. Any text that you type into this area will perform a search on the **Google Website**. In the example we typed in “Arizona Cardinals” the pressed the return key, and Google found about 9,750,000 results for that search (Figure 7).

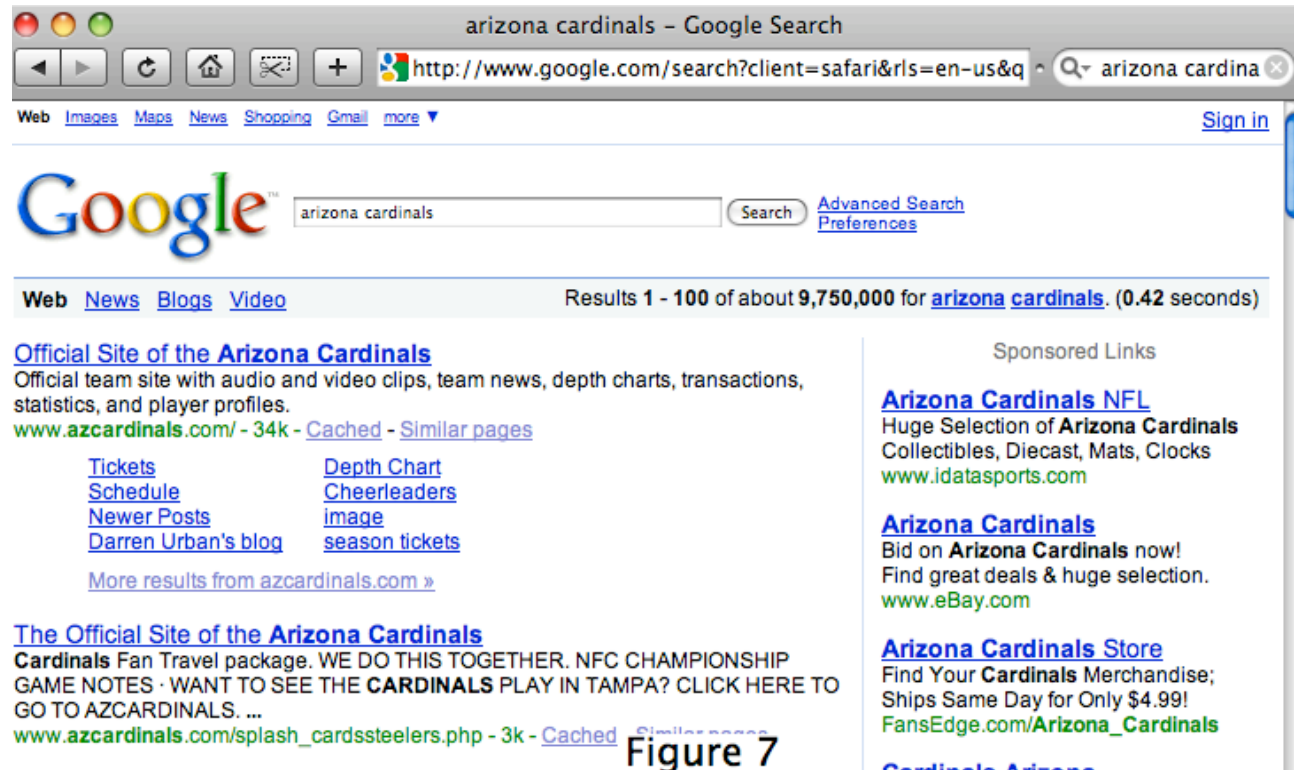

Google Magnifying Glass



Notice the Magnifying Glass and the small down pointing arrow next to it. This tool provides a quick drop down menu of the most recent pages that you have searched. This only works if you if you have searched by using the Google Bar, not a Google Website Search Page See Figure 8).) You may click on any of the items to quickly revisit a previous search.

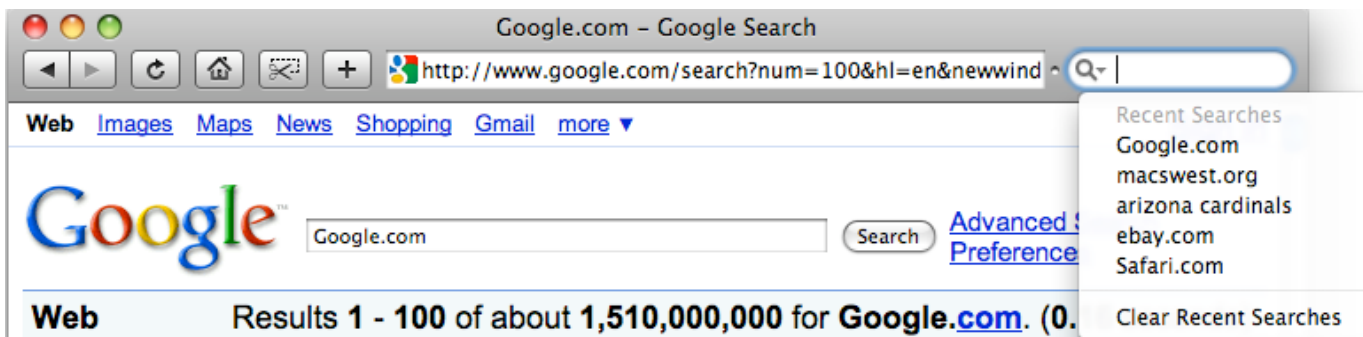

Bookmarks

Safari provides a couple of easy ways for you to bookmark a page so that you can return to it at a later time.

To make a bookmark, Click the + Button in the Safari Tool Bar (Figure 8

or,

To make a bookmark, click on Bookmarks in the Safari Menu.

Using either method a drop-down will appear (Figure 9),

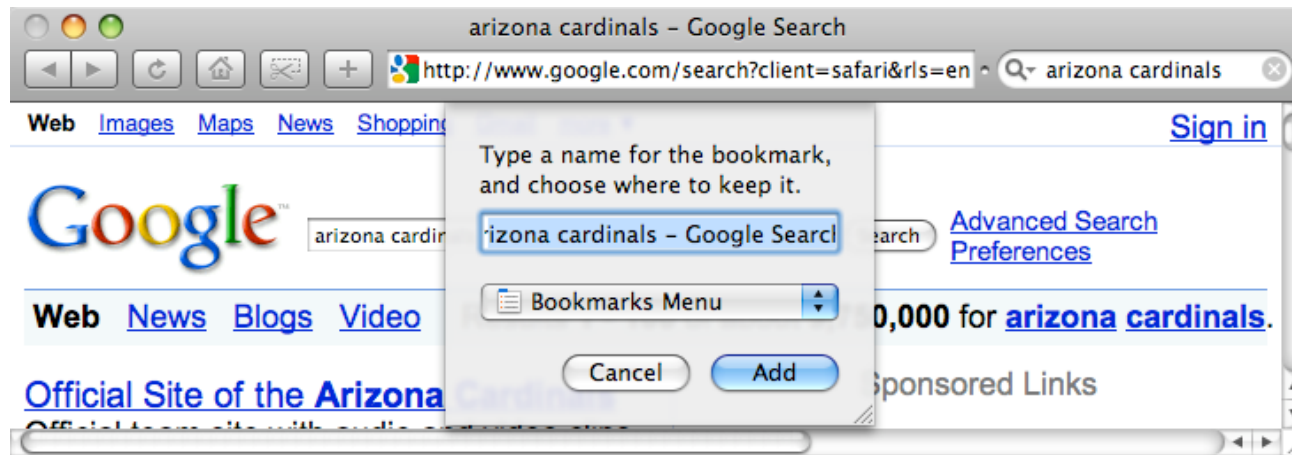
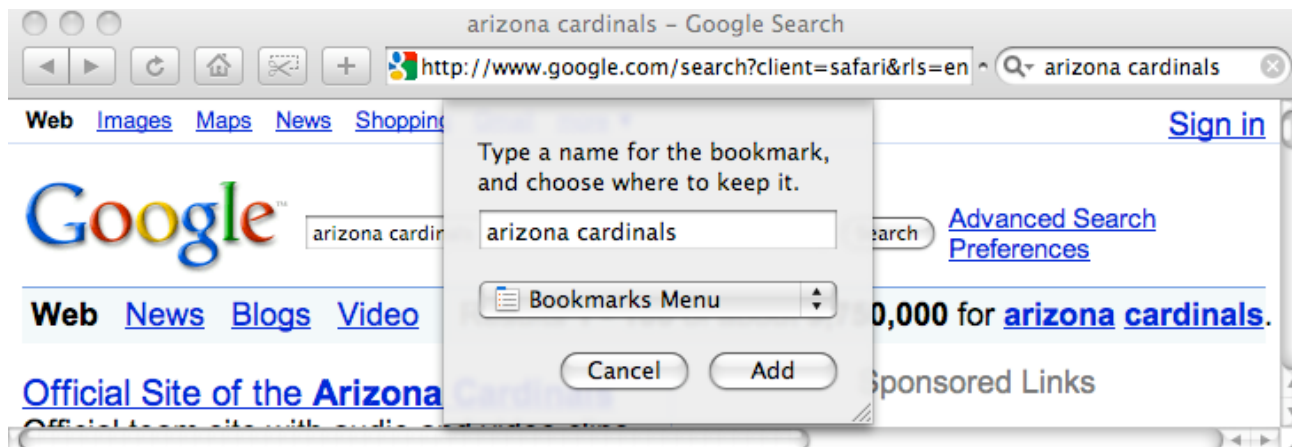

You can now name the bookmark, or shorten its displayed name to fit better in the Bookmark Bar, or elsewhere (Figure 10).

Select the place that you want to store the saved bookmark by clicking the up/down button to make a selection. (Figure 10).

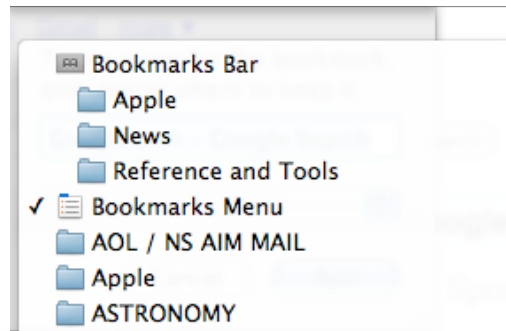

Then, click the add button to finish saving your new bookmark to the proper location.

Bookmarks Bar Easy Drop

You can also drag the icon to the left of the address in the Location Bar to the bookmarks Bar. The drop down menu will appear, then you can edit the name for the bookmark and click ok (Figure 10).

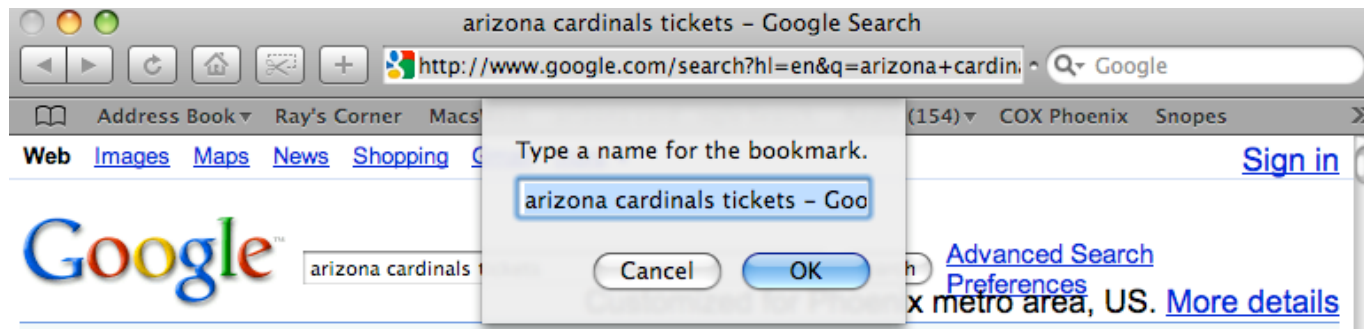

AutoFill in Safari

Whenever you begin to type in an address into the Location Bar, Safari automatically begins to fill in displays any websites that begin with the letters typed, that have been visited before (Figure 11). As you enter more of the letters of the address, the choices

narrow down. If you see the address that you want, click on it and Safari will autocomplete it for you.

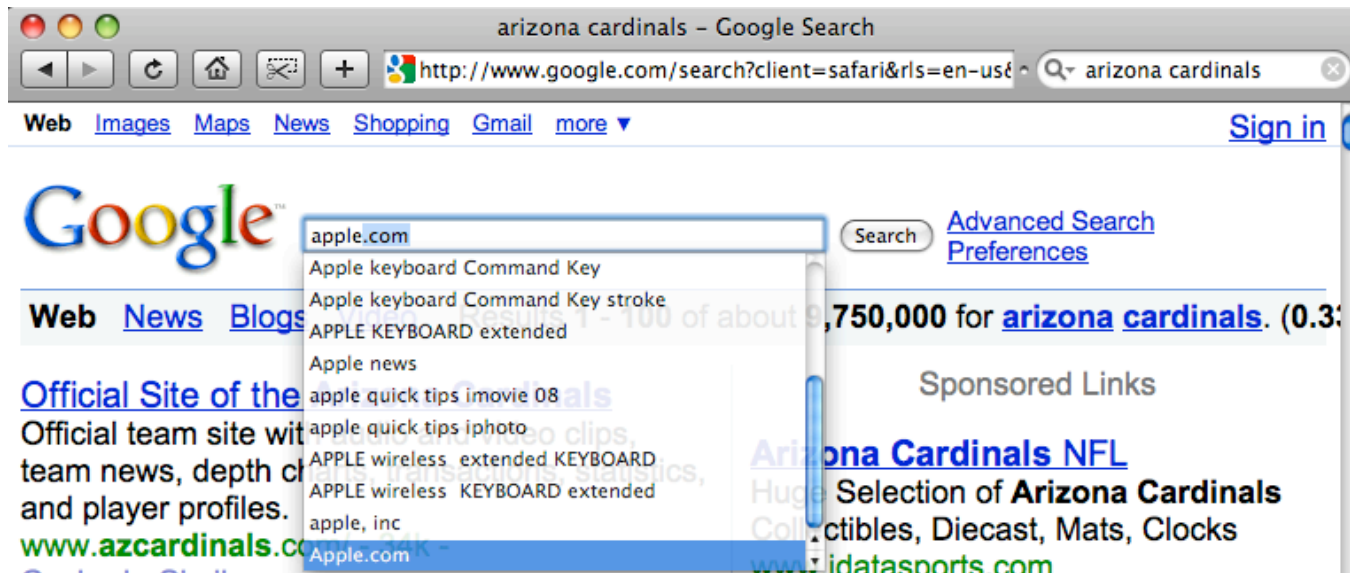

the address that you want, click on it and Safari will AutoComplete it for you (Figure 12).

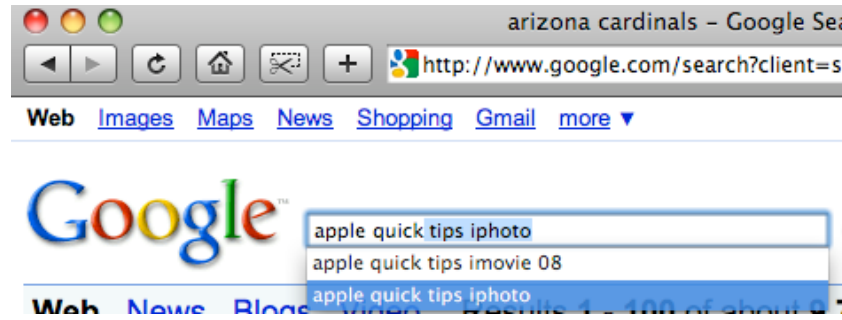

You can remove a **Bookmark** from the **Bookmarks Bar** by clicking and dragging it out. The bookmark disappears with a poof and a cloud of smoke.
